The son of Greek immigrants and born in Salisbury, Maryland, Senator Sarbanes has had a distinguished public service career. After graduating Wicomico Senior High School he attended Princeton University, was selected as a Rhodes Scholar, and then received a LLB degree from Harvard Law School. While at Harvard, he served as graduate secretary of Phillips Brooks House, the Harvard-Radcliffe volunteer service organization.

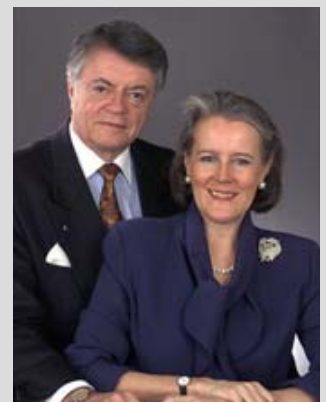
Elected to the U.S. Senate in 1976, and re-elected in 1982, 1988, 1994, and 2000. Serves as Ranking Member, Senate Committee on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs. Also serves on the Joint Economic Committee; Senate Foreign Relations Committee; Senate Committee on the Budget, and is Chairman of the Maryland Congressional Delegation.

Three-term member of the United States House of Representatives, first elected on November 3, 1970 to the 92nd Congress. Subsequently re-elected to the 93rd and 94th Congresses. Served in the Maryland House of Delegates, 1966-1970. Executive Director of the Charter Revision Commission of Baltimore City, 1963-1964. Administrative Assistant to Walter W. Heller, Chairman for President Kennedy's Council of Economic Advisers, 1962-1963.

Jukka Valtasaari serves as Ambassador of Finland to the United States. Between his Washington tours, Ambassador Valtasaari served as the Permanent Secretary for Foreign Affairs in Helsinki, the highest non-elected office in the Ministry for Foreign Affairs.

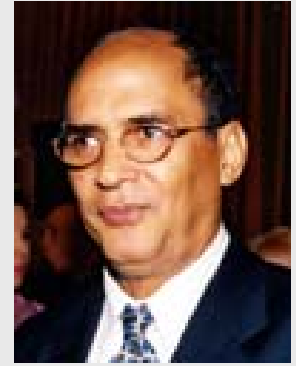

Govinda Gallery is pleased to present the first exhibition of Donovan's (Donovan Leitch) Sapphographs. Inspired by the lyric poetry of Sappho (7th century B.C.), Donovan captures in visual form the mythic beauty of this ancient artistic tradition. Donovan's Sapphographs evoke the aesthetic sensuality of nature and the power of its rituals to inspire artistic creation. A prolific songwriter, poet, and musician, Donovan is recognized as one of the most popular and innovative recording artists

of our time (*Mellow Yellow, Hurdy Gurdy Man, Atlantis, Jennifer Juniper*, among others). By incorporating elements of folk, jazz, classical, Caribbean, and Indian music, he became one of the central figures in the extraordinary musical and cultural revolution of the 1960s. [For you Donovan fans, check out his small but powerful scene in the 1965 Bob Dylan documentary "Don't Look Back," now out on DVD -- *the editor.*]

### About Chris Murray and Govinda Gallery

After earning his B.A. degree in Philosophy at Georgetown University, Chris Murray founded Govinda Gallery in 1975 in Georgetown. Some of the Gallery's highlights have included several exhibitions for Andy Warhol (with whom the Gallery was closely associated), the first exhibition of Annie Leibovitz's photographs, and a 20th Anniversary exhibition featuring photographs of Muhammad Ali by Howard Bingham. Govinda Gallery actively publishes catalogues, which Murray has edited for many of its exhibitions. This fall, Govinda Gallery celebrates its 30th Anniversary with the first exhibition ever of songwriter and musician Donovan's Sapphographs.

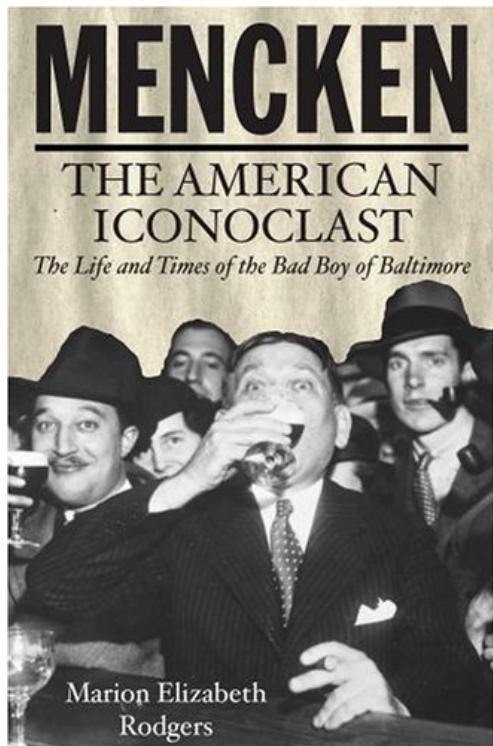

# An Evening with Marion Elizabeth Rodgers, Author of *Mencken: The American Iconoclast*

For much of the twentieth century, H. L. Mencken, a.k.a. The Bad Boy of Baltimore, was the country's most famous pundit, inspiring both love and fear and sometimes both. As the *Baltimore Sun* recently described him, "He's not an easy man to hug." But as *Publisher's Weekly* notes, even now, almost 50 years after his death, many of Mencken's political insights hold true. When few dared to shatter complacencies, Mencken fought all his life for civil liberties and free speech, including a free press.

Marion Elizabeth Rodgers, editor of *Mencken & Sara* and *The Impossible H. L. Mencken* does not shy away from her subject's faults. Her new biography, *Mencken: The American Iconoclast*, has received a starred review from *Publisher's Weekly* and praise from former *New York Times* columnist Anthony Lewis for its timeliness; other Mencken scholars, including the late Alistair Cooke, have praised the book for its thorough and vivid picture of a complex man who continues to provoke.

The evening will begin with a reception with Ms. Rodgers. She will also sign copies of her book, available for purchase.

## Docent Led Tour of "Style and Status: Imperial Costumes from Ottoman Turkey"

Distinguished by their remarkably bold designs, breathtaking colors and technical complexity, Ottoman imperial silks are considered to be among the most extraordinary works of art from the Islamic world. This exhibition for the first time ever presents approximately 66 of the world's finest Ottoman royal textiles from the collections of the Topkapi Palace Museum, Istanbul, the Kremlin Armory, Moscow and other national and international collections. Fashioned into clothing, furnishings and movable architecture, such as tent hangings and floor covers, silk textiles denoted rank and privilege and played important economic, political and a ceremonial roles in the life of the Ottoman Empire (1342–1924).

## Tour of Dumbarton House with Curator Brian Lang

**Monday, Dec. 12; 4:00 - 5:00 p.m.; Dumbarton House, 2715 Q Street, NW; \$3 members, \$8 non-members**

Dumbarton House is a fine example of Federal period architecture and offers a unique opportunity to view a home closely connected to the first years of the American Republic. The house has stood on the heights of Georgetown for over two centuries.

The property was built on a large tract of land patented in 1703 by an immigrant Scot, Ninian Beall. Mr. Beall named the land "Rock of Dumbarton" in tribute to his homeland.

The National Society of The Colonial Dames of America (NSCDA) purchased the house in 1928 and restored it to its early 19th century character. The NSCDA declared Dumbarton House its national headquarters and opened it as a museum to the public in 1932.

## CPIC Seeks Alumni

## **Harvard Memorabilia in the Library of The Society of the Cincinnati**
